Sight Fishing 101: 4 Tips for Success

What to look for and how to have success when bed-fishing this spring

you feed him for a day.

Sight fishing is a ton of fun. For those unfamiliar with the concept, the fisherman looks for fish from the bow of the boat or the shore and then casts with the goal of catching the fish he or she sees. This technique is exciting because the angler can see how the fish reacts to what the fisherman is doing. For anyone who has caught a bass by sight fishing, you know how exhilarating it can be. For those who

have not had this opportunity—I hope you get the chance to see a fish and then catch it! There are some prime

windows of opportunity for sight fishing. Obviously, clear water and bright conditions make it easier to see

the fish. But bright/clear skies and water are not essential for sight fishing. Here are 4 basic tips for this technique. While this is simply basic information for sight-fishing, hopefully it will inspire you to research the topic more, and to check in with the

coaches for more tips.

- 1. Get some polarized sunglasses. You can get a
 - cheap pair for less than \$10.
 - 2. Look for "beds" as taught recently at practice. Bass beds can look like a tire in the water or a cleared off circle/oval.
- Stay back. Don't get too close to the fish or you may spook it.
- 4. Don't rush or make sudden movements. It may take fish time to take the bait.

Overall, sight fishing can be rewarding and fun. Tight lines!
